Last July an email arrived from Oregon, written by Bob Rossio who asked what we might know about his family from Carbon Hill --- within a summer, the Rossio relatives were connected from New York to Virginia to Kansas to Oregon and back to Illinois.

Francesco Rossio and Rosalie Mercier arrived from Belgium with their baby son in 1872. Frank and Rosalie had 14 children; only 10



survived to adulthood. One little girl died in a cyclone in Oklahoma - Indian Territory. Today there are Rossio generations both local and widespread.

In Carbon Hill second son Henry Rossio and daughter Rose Rossio



Our 1992 centennial book tells of Rosa Mercier Rossio Daco's ice cream shop on First Street where her grandson Frank Testa courted Anne Martinec. Records show the Rossio girls' local marriages with Ruffatti, Lafferty, Scerine, Bertot, Arnold, and other familiar names.

One famous descendent is film writer Terry Rossio, co-writer of "Shrek" and of all three "Pirates of the Caribbean." His picture at left may show family resemblances...

Dedication of the New Gymnasium:

Coal City Courant, Dec 9, 1927

"The dedication of the new gymnasium to the ex-service men of the community held on Friday evening was attended by a large crowd including a good representation of the former soldiers. By exerting great effort the contractor and various firms had worked to complete the building and have things ready for the dedication.

At 8 o'clock Faletti's orchestra started to play Sousa's "Stars and Stripes Forever" as the service men marched in to their places in the reserved section. Following invocation by the Rev Mr. Leon Arpee, President Albert Rubin introduced the principal, Mr. A P Gossard, who made several announcements and told what the plans were for the use of the gymnasium and then turned the program over to Dr. F A Stockdale, who served as chairman for the evening. The exservice men were somewhat taken by surprise at the commands of "Attention" and "About Face" but the old training came to the fore and they responded. As they faced the audience, Dr. Stockdale paid high compliment to these men.

Architect J E Coyle, who planned the building, was the next speaker. He presented the building to the board of education, District 98. Dr. Stockdale then called on Hoover Opperman, a member of the contracting firm of Hal Opperman and Sons, of Pontiac, builders of the gymnasium. Following Mr. Opperman's remarks. Mr. Richard Hill, former president of the board of education was called upon to speak. After Mr. Hill came County Superintendent Root. At this point a more serious side was introduced into the program when everyone stood in silence for a time in memory of those men of the community who failed to return at the close of the war.

The main speaker of the evening was Hon. Mr. Henry R Rathbone, congressman-atlarge, who gave a most fitting address in which his good humor and deep insight into the community problems and the sacrifices of the ex-service men were most evident. Mr.

John Ross was called on following this address to give a response from the group of ex-soldiers. In his short response he spoke of the appreciation of the men on having they names handed down to future generations and predicted that this appreciation would grow in years to come when children with pride would point to the names of their fathers on the beautiful bronze tablet at the main entrance of the gymnasium.

The members of the audience came to their feet when the orchestra played the "Star Spangled Banner." The program closed with a benediction given by the Rev. Mr. George Shepherd. Following the close of the program open house was declared and the large crowd wandered over the building inspecting and admiring the beautiful and convenient new structure. "

It seems appropriate with Veteran's Day just behind us, a refurbished monument and another gymnasium underway, that we note in December 1927 there was not yet a WWII, no Korea, Viet Nam, Middle Eastern wars. That fresh bronze plaque of 1927 was only part of history.
